Grants support field research or other creative projects in Asia. Priority will be given to students with demonstrated long-term academic commitment to East or Southeast Asia, or who need substantial first-hand exposure to Asia to complete a course of academic study. In the application, students should specify how their proposals address technology transfer. Although the Fellowship is open to applicants wishing to pursue public service in the United States, international projects are preferred. Preference will also be given to projects which address the issues faced by disenfranchised, poor or disadvantaged communities or segments of society. The Fellowship will help underwrite projects which promote social, legal and economic reform and which may involve, but are not limited to, the fields of education, public health, and human rights. Council on Southeast Asia Studies at Yale	Funding from the Ford Foundation allows us to provide limited support for the research-related purposes of students with a demonstrated commitment to the field of Southeast Asian Studies (Burma/Myanmar, Cambodia, East Timor, Indonesia, Laos, Malaysia, Papua New Guinea, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, and Vietnam). Appropriate purposes for support include (but are not limited to) language training, summer research for masters thesis or senior essay, pre-dissertation research field work, and small supplements required to bring a research project to fruition. We do not fund long-term, basic dissertation research, nor do we consider applications for funding of activities connected with dissertation writeup. Requests for funding of brief visits (< 3-4 weeks) to fieldwork locales are generally discouraged as minimally productive. The Council strongly favors study or field research durations of at least 6 weeks or more. Bouchet Undergraduate Fellowship Program is an effort to increase the pool of young people qualified to meet the needs of educational institutions into the next century. Similar to the statements made by the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation with respect to a similar fellowship program administered in Yale College, "the [Edward A. Bouchet] program aims to reduce over time the serious under-representation of individuals from certain minority groups at the faculty level, as well as to address the attendant educational consequences of these disparities. The program serves the related goals of structuring campus environments so that they will become more conducive to improved racial and ethnic relations, and of providing role models for all youth."
